Donna Malley is an Occupational Therapy Clinical Specialist at The Oliver Zangwill Centre, where she has worked since 1998. She has over 20 years experience as an OT in the field of brain injury. She has jointly produced a booklet on Managing Fatigue after Brain Injury for Headway. This booklet received a Highly Commended Award at the British Medical Association Patient Information Awards 2009. She is also seconded to the NIHR's CLAHRC for Cambridgeshire & Peterborough, (Adult Theme) on a part-time basis as a Practitioner Researcher. In this role she is exploring good practice in health care provision for people with ABI, who, because of their complex long-term health condition, are at risk of social exclusion. Donna also has clinical and research interests in developing clinical models, the role of OT in neuropsychological rehabilitation, vocational rehabilitation and fatigue following acquired brain injury. She has been teaching on the Glasgow MSc in Clinical Neuropsychology since 2008.



Dr Andrew Worthington is Founder Director and Consultant in Neuropsychology and Rehabilitation at Headwise, an independent provider of multi-disciplinary rehabilitation across the lifespan, with individual and corporate clients throughout the country. He is Programme Director of two innovative MSc courses in brain injury rehabilitation and brain injury case management which he established at the University of Birmingham, where he is an Honorary Research Fellow in the Behavioural Brain Sciences Centre. His broad research interests include neuroimaging, risk perception and outcome measurement. He has an MSc in Health Economics and is currently involved in a major EU research project to evaluate home-based assistive technology for apraxia and action disorganisation.



Rodger Wood, PhD, DCP, C. Psych, FBPSS is Professor of Neuropsychology at Swansea University and Honorary Consultant Clinical Neuropsychologist at the Neuroscience Directorate, Morriston Hospital. He has worked in brain injury rehabilitation since 1979, at the Kemsley Unit, Northampton, Casa Colina Hospital, California, and most recently as Clinical Director of the Brain Injury Rehabilitation Trust, UK. He has been visiting Professor in Rehabilitation Medicine at New York State University, Buffalo. His current research and clinical work focuses on the nature and assessment of neurobehavioural legacies of traumatic brain injury.
